Coastal Habitats & Habitat Change - key ideas

1. The first clues

Coastal habitats connect land and sea. Tides, salt, waves and shelter make conditions change through time.

2. How the clues connect

Habitat loss can remove food or safe living spaces. Protecting one feature may help, but a plan should consider the organism's whole set of needs.

3. Our evidence record

Our shore record shows nesting cover removed while nearby feeding areas remain. Restoring appropriate cover addresses the documented loss; it does not prove every other need is already met.

Keep the science accurate

A habitat includes food, water, air and space, not only a nest. Use representative habitats without memorizing every biome.

Apply the evidence

Use a specific observation from this lesson to explain one choice. Point to a clue, then connect that clue to a scientific idea.

Talk through the evidence

1. What connects coastal conditions to change?

Expected answer: Tides and waves

Reasoning: Coastal habitats connect land and sea. Tides, salt, waves and shelter make conditions change through time.

2. Which feature was lost in our record?

Expected answer: Nesting cover

Reasoning: Our shore record shows nesting cover removed while nearby feeding areas remain. Restoring appropriate cover addresses the documented loss; it does not prove every other need is already met.

3. Which plan addresses that loss?

Expected answer: Restore suitable cover

Reasoning: Our shore record shows nesting cover removed while nearby feeding areas remain. Restoring appropriate cover addresses the documented loss; it does not prove every other need is already met.

4. Why check the rest of the habitat?

Expected answer: Organisms have several needs

Reasoning: Habitat loss can remove food or safe living spaces. Protecting one feature may help, but a plan should consider the organism's whole set of needs.

Guide the discussion

Ask learners to name the evidence that supports their answer. If an answer differs, revisit the matching key idea on page 2 and invite a revised explanation.
