Learning target

Explain sound as connected to vibrations.



Before you begin

Vibrations Make Sound - key ideas

1. The first clues

Sound is produced by vibrations. A vibrating object moves back and forth and can set surrounding material vibrating.

2. How the clues connect

Evidence may be visible or felt as well as heard. A speaker surface or plucked string can show movement related to sound.

3. Our evidence record

Our supplied record shows a string vibrating while a sound is detected and the sound stopping as the vibration settles. The task can be completed with text observations, without playing audio.

Keep the science accurate

Pitch and loudness differ. Sound needs a medium; no decibel calculations or exposure to loud demonstrations required.

Apply the evidence

Use a specific observation from this lesson to explain one choice. Point to a clue, then connect that clue to a scientific idea.

Talk through the evidence

1. What produces sound?

Expected answer: Vibrations

Reasoning: Sound is produced by vibrations. A vibrating object moves back and forth and can set surrounding material vibrating.

2. What does vibrating mean?

Expected answer: Moving back and forth

Reasoning: Sound is produced by vibrations. A vibrating object moves back and forth and can set surrounding material vibrating.

3. Which evidence links the string to sound?

Expected answer: Sound accompanies its vibration

Reasoning: Evidence may be visible or felt as well as heard. A speaker surface or plucked string can show movement related to sound.

4. Is listening to audio required here?

Expected answer: No

Reasoning: Our supplied record shows a string vibrating while a sound is detected and the sound stopping as the vibration settles. The task can be completed with text observations, without playing audio.

Guide the discussion

Ask learners to name the evidence that supports their answer. If an answer differs, revisit the matching key idea on page 2 and invite a revised explanation.
